COUNTY OFFICIALS, SHERIFF'S DEPUTIES, AND TREATMENT TEAMS GO DOOR-TO-DOOR IN METH-AFFECTED NEIGHBORHOOD IN IMPERIAL BEACH

Residents Encouraged to Report Meth-Related Crime and Seek Meth Treatment

WHAT:

Teams of elected officials, Sheriff's deputies, treatment providers and public health workers will go door-to-door in a drug-affected neighborhood in Imperial Beach and distribute refrigerator magnets and "Get Off Meth" brochures encouraging residents to report meth-related crime or to seek treatment for their drug addiction.

The distribution of the bilingual magnets and brochures, publicizing the Meth Hotline (877) No2-METH, is part of a countywide campaign to combat meth use and meth sales. The magnets will be distributed throughout the county by the Sheriff's Department Crime Prevention and COPPS Units.
